



Each Christmas, Jay and Heather Strommens' cozy Cape Cod-style home in Deephaven, Minnesota, far-flung Italian family join the Strommens and family. Lots of it. To kick off the holiday season, Heather decorates the house for Christmas the day before Thanksgiving. Though she dresses the exterior with bright, old-fashioned colored lights, inside she favors a muted palette of rosy pinks mixed with natural greens. The refined hues suit her home's English cottage style.

Natural materials take center stage against the calming colors. Pomegranates and pinecones fill bowls, vases show off branches with berries, and burlap ribbons dance across a mantel. In addition to the fir tree in the living room, Heather places fresh greens by the sleighful: on mantels, behind picture frames in a hallway and at place settings on the dinner table. "I get into Christmas and really go to town," says Heather, who used to own an antiques business.

The cozy home, with its festive flourishes, sets the mood for celebrating traditions. Each year, Heather hosts a spirited ornament exchange party for neighbors. The family usually goes caroling in the neighborhood and ice-skating at a nearby park. When Heather and Jay's oldest son, Jack, 16, comes home from hockey boarding school in Canada, they set up a rink in the yard for family and neighbors to enjoy pickup games.

The celebration culminates with Christmas Eve dinner, a tradition that has its roots in Italy, where Heather's grandfather was born. "We are Italians, and we all get in the kitchen and cook and cook," she says. The evening's designated chef is Heather's brother Jon. Using his grandmother Dorothy's recipes (which he has tweaked through the years), he makes meatballs, sausages, and hand-rolled spaghetti and ravioli. The whole gang helps assemble the pasta and bake Grandma's favorite dessert, chocolate pie. "Just spending time together is what makes it so special," Heather says.

After a day of cooking and playing in the snow, Heather pulls out holiday pillows and blankets. "I want everyone to feel like they can wrap up with a blanket and snuggle by the fire," she says. And curl up they do: All out-of-town guests sleep at the house. Adults lay their heads in the "garrottage" (a detached garage converted into a guest house cottage); kids roll out sleeping bags in the basement.
